Hopefully by May, if conditions are right, we will be able to begin our training at the Shikellamy Marina State Park.

The training environment is quite different with many more distractions than at the Center. There are ducks, squirrels, bicycles, skate boards, baby buggies and, of course, strange dogs.

That is why teaching attention is so important. If you want your dog to pay attention to you, then you have to be more interesting than any other possible distraction. Be sure to take the time to play with your dog.

If you need to correct your dog it's more of "catching them off guard" when they get distracted instead of a harsh correction. Don't yell, nag or jerk your dog around. The goal is to have the dog WANT to look at you, not out of fear.

Attention doesn't necessarily mean the cranked neck look. It just means that the dog is aware of your existence and is paying attention to you.

As we socialize with each other it is important to keep your eyes on your dog 100% of the time. If you must speak to someone else or get distracted, put your dog on a down or a stay command until you tell him otherwise. Or wait, on the other hand, means stay there momentarily and keep your attention on me until another command is given.

Not all dogs are friendly, so it is important to ALWAYS have your dog under control! You and your dog should approach all other dogs with caution. Always ask permission of the handler before letting the dogs sniff one another. Not all dogs are receptive to another dog sniffing or like dogs in their face.

If children are attending training classes, make sure they understand not all dogs are children friendly. Children should be taught how to pet a dog and ask first for the safety of all.

Breed of the Month Silky Terrier

The Silky Terrier is a native of Australia where it has long found favor with cottage dwellers. For years it was called the Sydney Silky in honor of its city of origin, but in 1955 it became known as the Australian Silky Terrier.

The Silky Terrier derives mainly from the Australian Terrier crossed with the Yorkshire. At any rate, by crossbreeding and development, this became an appealing Toy dog of eight to ten pounds.

During World War II, the Silky came to the attention of American and Canadian military personnel stationed in Australia. As these dogs were brought to the U.S. it did not take long for Americans to enjoy this breed, and the Silky Terriers were recognized by the AKC in 1959.



The Silky is friendly, but independent and likes to get its own way. He may attach itself to one family member, but it should be quick, friendly and responsive to all.

Although he is a member of the Toy Group, it has not forgotten its terrier heritage and can still be a good mouser of ratter, as he helped control rodents on many Australian poultry farms.

They are active dogs that love to run and play and retrieve balls, which can lead them into trouble if they aren't confined to a fenced yard.

The Silky is a lively, outgoing little dog and training is advisable. Its owners say its tremendous love and devotion are its best qualities. As a small house dog, a Silky Terrier will be a sweet, delightful and loving companion.
