As we look back on this year of 2007, I'm hoping we have all found enjoyment in coming to class, training our dogs, and the friendship of being together with new and old members. May the coming year find us continuing the same and making life better for both you and your canine friend.

With winter weather upon us, I will reflect upon some special care needs for our dogs.

Since most of our dogs spend most of their time indoors, she'll feel the cold outside just as we do. Many owners notice increase shedding and say their dogs pant constantly which reflect a dog's way of cooling off as she

goes from outdoors to in.

Add a fatty-acid supplement to your dog's diet and schedule more grooming to reduce fur on furniture. Consider lowering the thermostat where your dog sleeps.

Be aware of your dog's footpads with snow and ice. Salt and chemicals can harm your dog especially if she licks her feet. If you don't use booties, rinse her paws in clear warm water when you get home from a walk. Keep the nails trimmed and the hair cut on the bottom of the paws.

Stay vigilant to the danger of dehydration and hypothermia. A wet coat poses the greatest danger of hypothermia, so dry your dog after outdoor fun.

A word about automotive antifreeze: It tastes sweet to dogs and just a small amount causes lethal kidney damage. Leaky radiators may spill antifreeze, so inspect the ground under your parked car. Empty containers and any rags used should be disposed of. There are several types of antifreeze that are advertised as "pet safe" and serve as an alternative to standard antifreeze.

Also with winter months you should take charge and tame static electricity. A few tips are as follows:

- Use a humidifier to add moisture to the air in carpeted rooms
- Treat your sofa and fabric furniture with anti-cling fabric spray. (Note: be sure your dog is not sensitive to the chemicals)
- Lightly spray your dog's coat with a moisturizing conditioner before brushing or combing her
- Teflon-coated combs and brushes prevent static electricity in the hair coat better than nylon

Breed of the Month Border Collie

The Border Collie has been bred in the British Isles for centuries, but did not acquire its name until the early 1900's. It is intensely focused on herding livestock and responsive to its handlers every cue. You can even train them to respond to a raised eyebrow.

Enthusiasts agree wholly on one point: owners must be committed to mentally stimulating their Border Collie and fulfilling its energy needs. They were bred to cover many miles a day herding livestock so they can't be expected to act like a lap dog. That is why there are hundreds of these dogs in rescue across the country.



Prospective owners are drawn to the breed's good looks, agility and intelligence. But the Border Collie can be a challenge for the average person. Even though the dog is smart, people must train them. Smart doesn't mean good or obedient as a Border Collie can quickly learn the wrong things, including digging, chasing, nipping and herding children.

Border Collies shun coddling and demand a job. They can be taught to retrieve just about anything and are ideal for agility, flyball, and obedience. Without proper outlets for their herding instinct they can become obsessive and can work themselves into a frenzy watching motion they can't control.

Socialize Border Collies as puppies to prevent fear and aggression. Many people have acquired Border Collie mixes which tend to have the same characteristics as a pure bred.

For those willing to devote the time and energy to live happily with a Border Collie, the rewards are significant. They are an intelligent, warm loving animal that loves you, trusts you, and becomes part of you.

When Your Dog Looks Like You

Have you ever noticed that your perky next-door neighbor with long flowing locks look a lot like her sprightly long-haired dachshund? To a growing number of scientists, it's more than canine coincidence. One Venezuelan study of facial photographs shows more resemblance between owner-pet pairs than pairs that were randomly matched. An-other study from the University of California at San Diego found that, when shown separate photos of pets and owners, subjects could often link them (but only if the dogs were purebreds). Both studies suggest the same psychological mechanisms are at work when we pick mates who resemble us. People tend to be comforted by faces that match the one they see in the mirror. That trust factor extends to the animal kingdom, too. (Katie Brophy)
