Old Friends by Connie Cuff



John Paul Scott, (1909-2000) was the first Canine Behaviorist and founded the field with his pioneering studies beginning 65 years ago. He set the frame-work, the basis for advice behaviorists give dog owners every day. He had many dogs in his lifetime. As he quoted, "A dog will never tell you what a fool you are".

In 1945, in doing research at the Roscoe B. Jackson Memorial Laboratories in Bar Harbor, Maine, he found in studying human genetic and child development there was no parallel with dogs.

He began his studies which continued for 25 yrs, and along the way pinpointed the critical period for puppy socialization and all the fundamentals now known about canine genetics.

In his research, which began the moment a liter was born, he found that isolated puppies younger than 3 weeks would stay quiet and content as long as their basic needs were met. By the fourth week they were downright loud and needed company. With company, whether from a person or a dog, they were content.

Scott proved that from 4 weeks to 9 weeks pups will bond more easily with people, other animals, strange objects and strange places than after 10 weeks. In fact, from 4-9 weeks just a brief encounter can do the trick for a lifetime.

If you take a pup away from its liter earlier than 4 weeks and raise it away from other dogs, it will be solely attached to humans. It will be ill-equipped to interact with its own kind, a dog that thinks it's a person. If you remove a dog at 10 weeks or later he will be maladjusted to humans.

He also identified kennel dog syndrome. A typical dog may interact fine with its litermates, or other dogs raised strictly in the kennel setting it has always known. If it is removed to any other setting, the dog may be fearful or aggressive and will be a challenge to have as a housepet. Those

dogs pay the ultimate price for ignorant breeders and puppy mills That is why pups must be socialized with various people and places during their critical period of socialization.

When purchasing a dog from a good breeder, they will tell you how they have socialized the puppies, handling each of them since birth, and having them introduced to new surroundings.

That is why our Star Puppy Class has been so successful, and I thank Marjean and Sara in training these young dogs to become well-socialized adult dogs.

Breed of the Month Shih Tzu submitted by Connie Cuff

The Shih Tzu is smart, tough and can learn manners as long as the owners do not give in to constant indulgence. These dogs travel well, don't dig, require a big yard and are the perfect balance between tough and pretty. People do tend to spoil them but this breed needs to be trained and well-behaved just like a big dog.

In the mid 1800s, these highly prized "lion dogs" were occasionally given to members of the Manchu dynasty as gifts from Tibet. It wasn't until the 1930s that the Shih Tzu was clearly distinguished from other breeds such as the Lhasa Apsa and the Tibetan Spaniel.



For the Shih Tzu, human companionship is job one, and

this small dog with its magnificent coat, luminous dark eyes, expressive face and proud topknot is an expert in that field. They are patient, funny, friendly and tune in to the subtle moods and changes within the family.

Often a good match for seniors and empty-nesters. The Shih Tzu doesn't need much exercise. They make great companions for gentle children, however children should always be supervised around any dog.

There are challenges with this breed, such as grooming needs. Their gorgeous coat is long, soft, and similar to human hair, but the undercoat can mat easily. Many owners keep them cut short, but it still requires combing every few days to prevent matting. Also, the large and limpid eyes tend toward dryness and may require daily eye drops.

Known health problems include renal dysplasia, liver disease, dry eyes and anemia. They are good with other pets if kept safe when with larger dogs.

Perhaps they tend to sleep on pillows, live on laps, wear satin ribbons and bask in long, luxurious grooming sessions. Put in the necessary effort and you'll be rewarded with years and years of love.
