**Old Friends** by Connie Cuff

There was a time when you rarely encountered the word "socialization" in dog circles. Today it's the buzzword.

A half-century ago dogs did their own socialization. They wandered freely in neighborhoods, accompanied kids to the bus stop, and hung out with their pals all day. They got into occasional scuffles, but they worked it out.

Today our pet-owning population is made up of canine guardians, and many of our four-legged family are kept inside our homes and supervised closely around other dogs. They encounter each other at training class, on-leash greeting or at a dog park.

Behavioral scientists have identified the period from 4 to 14 weeks as the most important window of time for a puppy's socialization. He'll most likely believe the world is a safe and happy place. You must be careful during your socialization efforts that you do not create negative association with the world around him. You need to be sure he's having a great time playing fun games, getting good stuff and protected from scary things while you're teaching him the world is a safe and happy place.

Think of taking your pup to a soccer game where screaming kids can't wait to see your new pup! They run toward the dog screaming and oogling over him. The terrified pup screams, peas and tries to run away. The owner scoops the dog up in her arms further trapping the dog with a child trying to grab to pet him, the dog snaps at the boy. When the Mother smacks the pup for being bad, further traumatizing the dog.

You now have taught the puppy negative association, children are scary, they try to grab your hand and snapping is a successful behavior for making scary hands go away.

Of course, your dog's genetics also influence his behavior and social tendencies. When picking a pup you should always try to see the Mother and Father. If the Mother is fearful and aggressive, pups can learn that behavior from watching how the Mother reacts to humans or environmental stimuli.



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Don't despair if you adopt from a shelter and know nothing about the dog's genetics. The answer is to super-socialize every single puppy or dog regardless of what you think or know about his genetics.

There's no such thing as overkill. You can't do too much. Pups and dogs who are super-socialized tend to assume that new things they meet in life are safe and good until proven otherwise.

Our dog club members are doing a good job working toward a well-socialized dog. By exposing them to children at reading, nursing homes, parades, and just bringing them to class will give them a lifetime of good behavior around many situations.

# Breed of the Month English Setter

The English Setter is the oldest setter known today. It descended from crossbreeding between the Spanish Pointer, Springer Spaniel and other Water Spaniels. So called because the dog would naturally crouch or set, when it spotted game.

The English Setter came to be seen as having two distinct classes: Laverack's show setters were prized for looks and elegance, while Llewellen's field setters excelled at hunting and field work. It was imported to the United States from England in the latter half of the 19th Century and recognized by the American Kennel Club in 1878.

The breed's standard temperament is best described as a "Gentleman by Nature". However, it can be strong-willed and mischievous. English Setters are energetic, people-oriented dogs that belong in families that can give them attention and activity



or be used by a hunter, where they have a job. Two dogs from our club, Pat Campbell's Riley and Katie Flock's Shelby are therapy dogs, and we are glad to have them with us.

English Setters are very intelligent and can be trained to perform about any task, but their natural bird instinct can make it difficult in outdoor environments. Since their temperament is a soft one, they are very sensitive to criticism.

Some of the genetic problems they have are hip and elbow displasia, congenital deafness, hypothyroidism and a specific form of cancer.

Having owned two English Setters from the field line, I know what a wonderful breed this is. It did take a lot of work as they did have the hunting instinct. They both received a CGC and one attained a CD title in obedience. As with any breed it is in the amount of time you put into training your dog and a life-time commitment brings many rewards.
