Know when to say "No". The real question is: should you say "No" before you punish, as you punish or after you punish? In order to correctly tell your dog what he did wrong you must say "No" before you punish him.

Three examples of methods of correction for a dog that jumps on guests when they enter the home -

Method #1 - As the dog starts to jump on the guest the owner grabs a squirt bottle and yells "No" at the same time as he blasts the water. The dog dodges

away from the water but still jumps on the guest.

Method #2 - Each time the dog starts to jump on the guest the owner sprays the dog with water. After he starts spraying, he starts yelling "No" again. Again the dog dodges the spray but still jumps on the guest.

Method #3 - The dog's front paws leave the ground to jump on the guest and the owner yells "No". He then takes several seconds to take aim and blasts the dog with water. The guest is asked to leave for a moment. The sequence is repeated several times. The dog begins to back off from the guest rather than automatically leaping forward. The owner can give her affection and treats for not jumping on the guest.

The last one works best. The other methods fail because they do not use "No" for the dog to identify what she did wrong.

In the first two examples the dog learned to avoid the water rather than avoid the jumping.

In the third example the dogs behavior changed based on the word "No" rather than being spritzed. The proper use of the word "No" at the correct time in a few repetitions, the dog's behavior is corrected and you can start reinforcing good behavior.

This correction can be used effectively with our choke chain in training our dogs or other situations. So the next time someone tells you to say "No" at the same time you correct your dog - tell him to duck instead.

Breed of the Month American Fox Hound

The American Fox Hound is older than the United States and can trace its history back more than 300 years. They appear in the records of early English settlements along the Eastern Seaboard. George Washington kept hounds at Mount Vernon and always tried to improve his dogs through crossbreeding.

Although the AKC first recognized the breed in 1896, it has never been a popular show dog. One reason is dogs bred for field trials don't adapt well to the show ring. They also get cuts, bruises and bumps in the field which don't endear them to judges.

Training for an obedience title can be a challenge, as they can be stubborn like a hound, and you have to convince them it is something they want to do.

An intelligent breed, the Foxhound seems to know to conserve energy until it is out in the field. They love to run and they are very curious. Foxhounds are playful and loving with their families, but some may be aloof around strangers.



Field trial hounds are bred for speed and competitive nature. A dog used in traditional English-style fox hunting must get along with the other dogs because they are used in packs of 15 or 20.

Breeding variations has spared the Fox Hound many genetic disease, such as hip and bone problems that plague other large breeds.

Their hunting skills must stand up under mental stress and strain. An owner of a Fox Hound who shows them says they are so smart. If you live with one long enough he'll know what you're thinking before you'll know what you're thinking.
