In training our dogs they not only absorb sound, but tone and visual cues, as well.

Many times people ask me "Will you train my dog?" I reply, "No, I will train you to train your dog."

Dogs draw on all kinds of information when we give a command: speech, body language, even by looking at facial expressions. Whatever is learned comes

from the repetition of the word or sound, and then the association the dog makes with the related thing or action.

When we train a new behavior a dog will learn what works and what doesn't by their response to our command. If he hears "good boy" and gets a treat or affection, he knows that's right. On the other hand, if he jumps on you and hears the word "no" and is pushed away that's wrong.

Lets assume your dog does not deserve the severity of "no" and we introduce the word "wrong". If you start saying the word "wrong" in a normal tone of voice when Fido makes a mistake, it will take on the meaning "why don't we try it again".

This tells the dog that there was something wrong with the behavior and to get the prize he has to try it again. Unlike "no", which tends to reduce the chance that Fido will play the game.

Instead of repeating the command such as "sit" three or four times, say wrong, turn your back and walk away. The dog is now trying to figure out what went "wrong" Ask him to "sit" again. If his response is better, praise him and treat.

While the average dog can connect signals and reinforcements in a few repetitions "wrong" is more difficult for a dog to understand. Expect some time for the dog to understand this new command and try to use it sparingly at first.

Be sure to reward any improvement in Fido's performance when using the word "wrong" meaning his training will continue.

Developing tools that aid in communication with our dogs and reducing the need for punishment can make learning a fun and positive experience for you and your pet. Sometimes learning it "wrong" can get you on the right track.

Breed of the Month Irish Setter

Fun-loving, adventurous, Irish Setters need equally energetic owners who'll give them plenty of exercise. If no one is around to show an Irish Setter a good time, it'll make its own fun.

The Irish Setter's scarlet coat makes it one of the showiest members of the Sporting Group. In the show ring Judges look for traits that reflect the breed's original purpose as a gun dog. Though the breed rarely competes in field trials, where competitors favor Pointers and English Setters, they find competition in hunt tests and excel in obedience.

The original Irish Setters of the 18th Century were different looking than the Setter of today; they were a mix between Irish Water Spaniel and Irish Terrier or English Setter, Spaniel and Terrier. The Red Setter developed in Ireland 100 years later and became the preferred breed for aristocrats became the preferred breed for aristocrats became



and became the preferred breed for aristocrats because of their beauty.

In the 1970's when the Disney movie "Big Red" and President Nixon's dog King Timahoe were popular it began a surge in the breed which caused a population explosion. This caused problems with more people concerned about profit without regard to health and temperament.

Puppyhood for an Irish Setter tends to last until they are 2 to 3 years old. Once they've gotten through that wild and wooly puppy stage, they usually settle down to become calm and trustworthy dogs.

To have a well-behaved adult you must invest time and energy in training. Love tempered with firmness, never harshness or cruelty, is the wise owner's way of schooling an Irish.

Epilepsy, hip dysplasia, thyroid disorders and bloat can occur in Irish Setters. Buying your Irish from a reputable breeder can help insure you get a healthy dog.

Every Irish Setter is a champion in the eyes of those who love this charismatic sometimes mischievous dog. As one owner commented: "God made 'em good, but sometimes they have the devil in 'em. Kelly Pastuszek can share with you stories as a one-time owner of an Irish Setter.-
