#### **Old Friends**

Whether training or walking your dog are you paying attention to them? Not only are you watching them, but are they watching you?

If you have your dog out for a walk and they are pulling you everywhere, especially if you use a retractable leash, you are not teaching them anything about walking on a loose lead. Many people spend time when walking on a cell phone, or chatting with a walking partner and are not taking the opportunity to train their dogs to walk on a loose lead.

When your dog pulls toward something, don't let him reach it (and thereby be reinforced); stop in your tracks and resist until he slacks the leash. Watch for even fleeting moments of good behavior and reinforce it the second it happens with lots of praise.

This is a good time to use your whistle. Every once in a while when walking, toot your whistle, say the dog's name and come, reward with praise and then give a small treat or use his favorite toy. You can use this especially when the dog is focused on a squirrel or anything that is more interesting than you.

Ray Ramos spent some time with us at class and did a nice job speaking to us about problems we were having with our dogs. One of his comments was to relax and have fun when training. It is important when we come to class to relax and enjoy what you are doing. A dog feels our emotions all the way down the leash. If we have tension on the leash, the dog will struggle when walking and learn nothing no matter what type of collar you are using on your dog.

The following was taken from the last newsletter written by Dixon - May 2005

"If your dog is not paying attention to you, even the simple exercise will become one that takes longer for the dog to learn. Your dog should be looking at you at all times. The only time the dog should take his eyes off of you is when the exercise requires the dog to move away from the handler. When you are training get your dog up with a lot of praise and keep him that way throughout the training. If you want undivided attention from your dog, give him your undivided attention.

## **Breed of the Month** Bernese Mountain Dog

Known in Switzerland for hundreds of years, the Bernese Mountain Dog is one of four varieties of Swiss mountain dog. The sturdy breed historically specialized in drafting, trekking down mountain paths, pulling carts of milk and cheese. He also worked at his master's side as a guardian and general farm hand. The Bernese Mountain Club has revived the breeds original purpose by conducting draft tests.

Even though these dogs are naturally obedient, without training, leadership, and guidance you end up with a 100 pound dog that doesn't behave. Socialization is very important as they have a natural tendency toward shyness.

The dog's history as a working dog prepares the breed to succeed as a therapy dog and they also are good with children.



Like all large breeds, they must not grow too quickly in the first year or they can suffer from serious orthopedic problems later in life. Growing puppies must be kept from rough play and jumping as it puts too much stress on developing shoulders and elbows.

The Berner doesn't drool but it does shed. The double coat sheds heavily twice a year so a thorough brushing daily keeps them tidy.

Susceptible to heat stroke they don't tolerate long hikes in hot weather, but when it snows, they think they've died and gone to heaven.

Potential owners should understand that a Berner's average life span averages only 7 1/2 years. The breed is prone to many medical problems including cancer, hip dysplasia, bloat, and von Willebrand's disease, a bleeding disorder.

Yet, despite their short lives, when Bernese Mountain Dogs give their affection, they really give it for life. As one owner said, "After discovering the Bernese after having many different breeds, it's been a love story ever since."
