These are some helpful training tips which bear repeating, even to me as a trainer since we jump to big steps instead of looking back on the basics.

Take training in small steps at the pace of your dog. It is better to succeed slowly in small steps that to try big steps and fail.

Even clever dogs can encounter difficulties. Distractions, the activity you are teaching, and the tools you are using can all create barriers to learning and retention of what has been learned.

We are always training. 24 hours a day, seven days a week and 52 weeks a year. Good behaviors need repeating many times to become a habit. Be a trainer always.

Help your dog, put it in a position where it can do right. Nothing succeeds like success. By channeling his thoughts, actions and directions to do what you are teaching and succeed, you will avoid mistakes.

Guide and show, and always give your dog the benefit of the doubt if it goes wrong. Sometimes dogs do not understand what we mean - even when we think they do. Distance, environment, body communication, distractions all affect interpretation and understanding.

Even dogs have off days. An upset stomach, tiredness, muscle strain, a mood swing, a female in season can create off days.

Be patient, take your time, and keep calm. Count to 20 and then put your dog in a position where it learns what is required.

Be confident, positive and clear in all you do. A dog cannot be confident unless you, as a trainer, are confident, so the dog believes in you and wants to follow your guidance.

Stop on a high when your dog is doing well. Stop on success with each session.

Training is exercise. Make exercise and training fun and they can become so related they are one and the same.

Never be too proud to go back to the basics.

Breed of the Month Dachshund

These hot-dog-shaped hounds have keen noses, wanderlust and independent spirits.

One breeder discusses temperament with potential buyers stressing you can't trust a Dachshund off-leash.

Centuries of breeding gave this dog the shape, strength, and tenacity to chase badgers through brush and into burrows (Dachshund means "badger dog" in German).

Specialized varieties emerged in the 17th and 18th centuries: the Smooth for following prey into burrows and the Wirehaired for overland hunting and tracking.

The Wirehair's boldness and courage suggest Terrier influence. The Longhair has a calmer demeanor. The Smooth tends to scheme. Longhairs are very happy just to sit on the couch with



you and watch a tennis match. Smooths are more fickle. They are too busy stealing each other's toys to hang out with you.

All varieties pose obedience challenges. That little bit of stubbornness, combined with their high intelligence, make obedience training extremely important.

They can get along with cats and older children who know how to handle small dogs.

They excel as watchdogs and their playfulness keeps owners amused. Food motivates them more than anything so they easily can become obese which is dangerous for this breed.

Disc disease is a serious and painful condition which can result in temporary or permanent paralysis. Contributing factors are obesity, jumping from high places and sharp side-to-side movements.

Whatever the size, color or coat type, the unforgettable wiener dog wiggles its way into people's hearts. You just can't help but fall in love with them. It is nice to have Joannah Skucek from Mifflinburg with Dascha a dachshund with us.
