Radar was a beautiful German Shepherd boy who was surrendered to an LA County Animal Shelter when he was 9 months old. He was due to be euthanized at the shelter due to overcrowding until Westside German Shepherd Rescue stepped in to save this hunky boy

as they do with so many others. Yet Radar's rescue story did not end there; it was soon learned that he had a genetic condition where his hair follicles were growing on the lining of the eyes. The poor boy was in such discomfort and could barely open his eyes. He would have to have laser surgery to fix the condition, so Westside German Shepherd Rescue began fundraising for his treatment.

Nothing broke Radar's spirit. He stayed a happy, sweet boy throughout the ordeal, and recovered nicely. Months later, a kind police officer adopted Radar when he fell in love with his profile on Adopt-a-Pet.com. His new owner enrolled him in bomb-sniffing school.

Turned out it's a good thing he did because Radar had a gift. He graduated in the top of his bomb-sniffing school class and is now one of the best bomb-sniffing dogs in the country. Radar is considered a full-on LAPD officer and was flown to Washington for the Presidential Inauguration to help protect President Obama! It's quite a leap from shelter to White House. Goes to show you never know how grand a dog can be when given a little love and security. Radar's life was luckily saved and now he works to save other lives. Best of all, he reminds us all to vote adoption.

I know of many volunteers who help Cheryl Hill at Mostly Mutts, including Sara Fry who has been volunteering there for years. I meet college students at Bucknell when we visit with TDI and they speak of their volunteer work at shelters.

All of us have something to share as a volunteer doing TDI work, helping the homeless animals or a project that has been started called SPAN (seniorspets.org). They assist senior citizens with pets to keep the human-pet

Breed of the Month French Bulldog

The French Bulldog and its popular cousin the Bulldog, are descended from mastiff-type breeds. In the early part of the 19th Century in Britain, blood sports were outlawed and the Bulldog became one of Britain's most enduring symbols. By 1850, small Bulldogs were a common sight and as the Industrial Revolution forced many English laborers to France in search of employment, many would not leave without their little Bulldogs. This was good news to the British who were set on standardizing dogs at 50 or more pounds.

It wasn't long before these game little dogs caught the interest of the French. As a working dog, it was prized for its protective nature as well as its exceptional ability as a rat exterminator and badger hunter.



More than this, it proved itself to be he most loyal of companions with a clown-like, charismatic personality.

By 1880, their popularity was widespread and soon they were being exported regularly to the U.S. It was the Americans who were the first to organize a French Bulldog Club in France and their formal breed recognition with the AKC was in 1898.

The French Bulldog should be alert, intelligent and exhibit sensible guardian instincts. They enjoy a good time, and though notoriously stubborn, they're adaptable and adept at knowing when to play or when it's time to just sit on the couch watching TV.

Sociable Frenchies thrive on companionship and are usually placed in situations where people work from home, take their dogs on the job or have non-traditional schedules.

Frenchies do not require clipping or special grooming, just an occasional bath and nail trim with special attention to cleaning the ears and facial wrinkles is sufficient.

It is a short-faced breed, and as a result are susceptible to various ailments and physical restrictions. Special care should be given during warm weather. Most French Bulldogs are delivered by caesarean section and because of these precautions and the necessity of veterinary care, the cost of a Frenchie is high.

In all respects, the delightful French Bulldog is a gem. It is ideal in size, easy to maintain and like the French themselves, a bit eccentric, sensitive and interminably lovable. We are glad to have Heidi Kling from Mifflinburg with her French Bulldog, Moose in our AKC Star Puppy Class.
