



## Old Friends

Dog training can be successful if we understand the five factors for what you want out of life and these can be applied to having a happier, better behaved dog.

Factor #1 Dogs live in the present and they don't waste energy feeling guilty about past failures. A direct focused approach is the best way to be successful.

Factor #2 Be specific—you hear so many people say, "My dog knows how to sit, but he's just being stubborn," or, "He does it well at home, but doesn't want to do it here. There are too many distractions." A dog should sit anywhere, be it on carpet, tile floor, grass or concrete.

Training the dog in different locations lets him know what you are asking him to do no matter what.

Factor #3 Develop a step-by-step goal. Training your dog in small increments instead of spending hours on trying to correct a behavior will teach the dog in less time. Always end your training with something the dog knows so he can feel good about himself.

Factor #4 Learn to relax—A dog senses if you are tense. The calmer the trainer is, the more he will be in control of his dog. You hear people who compete in dog shows say, "I was so nervous that's why my dog didn't do well." The old saying of taking a few short breaths and relax is so true. Dixon always talked to the people he tested for TDI/CGC and they appreciated that he made them feel relaxed and at ease.

Factor #5 Choose the right environment and attitude to train—some things should be done with little distraction at first, but all dogs should be trained around other dogs so they can be socialized. You should be a leader but also display playfulness and affection. Success is attained when confidence rules. As stated by Paul Owens author of *The Dog Whisperer*, "Correct the problem not the dog. With that attitude, everything becomes a tail wagging game and that's the greatest Fido Factor of them all."

Make this a safe holiday for our pets. If you add preservative to tree water and Fido drinks it he can suffer vomiting and diarrhea. Tinsel and ribbon can ball up in the GI tract of dogs and cats and require surgery. Four to five ounces of chocolate can be toxic to your pets. Keep your pets away from poinsettias, mistletoe, and holly.

My wish to everyone this year is to have a joyful and holy holiday filled with good friends and fond memories of the people who have enriched our lives and made us the people we are today.

We received a thank you letter and thank you bone basket for bringing the dogs to the "Read to the Dogs program" in Milton.



The question for 2006--should such a practice exist? Certainly there must be veterinarians who would like to focus just on dogs and only take a cat-patient if need be. Small animal practices, of course, take both cats and dogs. But, there is enough difference in the two species to warrant an overhaul of our present system. Perhaps veterinary hospitals should re-examine their patient population. It might be wise for them to conjure up a survey of patients to determine not only how many cats and how many dogs are patients, but within the species how many canines are engaged in specific performance oriented tasks like agility, therapy, search and rescue, protection, herding, pets-at-home, show, obedience etc. These functions often determine in part the injuries and specific problems which cross breeds.
